


BETTER SEXUAL AND REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH AND RIGHTS FOR ALL INDONESIA (BERANI)











From 2018 to 2023, through the Better Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights for All in Indonesia (BERANI) Programme, the Government of Indonesia, UNFPA and UNICEF, worked together in **improving sexual and reproductive health and rights for women and young people in Indonesia**.

The joint programme has delivered a range of initiatives and interventions focused on these 5 areas:



Enhancing midwifery education and regulation



Strengthening partnership to improve family planning



Strengthening health sector response to gender-based violence



Community outreach and empowerment



Providing youth-friendly sexual and reproductive health services and information



KEY RESULTS - BERANI Making Changes





5 midwifery education centers

have adopted and implemented **high-quality** midwifery education standards.



National competency exam pass rate has increased to as compared to 50% at the start of the programme.



of the graduates work in health care and education sectors



47 private clinics

were strengthened to provide quality youth-friendly sexual and reproductive health information and services, especially for young women.



332 teachers

including 30 special school teachers were trained to deliver comprehensive sexuality education for **adolescents** in schools.



983 Community Health Centers

were capacitated to provide quality response to gender-based violence.



7 Gender-Based Violence service delivery points

were strengthened to provide essential service package.



433 Midwives

were coached on high quality midwifery practices, including waste management and care for **people with disabilities**.

12,463 midwives participated in the online training on midwifery care in COVID-19 pandemic situation.



150 health service workers & 95 non-health service workers

Incl. psychosocial counselor and law enforcement officers have improved their skills in responding to **gender-based violence**.



of 2,371 GBV survivors were able to access the service they needed with informed consent.



GBV survivors received dignity kits.

Community outreach/ empowerment LEAVING NO ONE BEHIND



28,779 young people

(68% female and 32% male) received sexual and reproductive health information.

6,870 young people

(76% female and 24% male) accessed the provided sexual and reproductive health service.

7,852 young people

(77% female and 23% male) received comprehensive sexuality education.

57 digital youth and sexuality content creators

trained to develop sexual and reproductive health-related contents with combined audience of over 600,000 young people.

4,860 community members

reached through **village dialogues** and **women's prayer groups.**

29,918 adolescents

received information on menstrual hygiene management, sexual and reproductive health and rights, and child marriage.



Policy and advocacy



21 policies, advocacy strategies, and roadmaps

were developed to promote sexual and reproductive health and rights.

12 policy briefs developed and disseminated

to improve policies that promote sexual and reproductive health and rights.

93 parliamentarians

were trained on the prevention of child marriage and female genital mutilation at the national and sub-national level.
