13 CLIMATE ACTION



We're noticing a concerning trend that is becoming more and more apparent.

According to the **World Meteorological Organization (WMO)**, the climate is rapidly warming, with temperatures surpassing 1.5 degrees Celsius for the first time in early 2024. Accelerated warming means more heatwaves and other extreme weather events such as floods, droughts, and storms that lead to food insecurity and extinction.

Project Highlight

Conplas' journey in transforming waste and empowering communities

At the heart of Lombok, West Nusa Tenggara, Sudirman is troubled by Indonesia's polluted shores. "It was the opposite of my childhood memories of the clean shores I enjoyed. I worry that future generations may never witness the extraordinary beauty of Indonesia's shores due to human carelessness," he said.



Driven to preserve the beauty of Lombok, Sudirman took action by founding Conplas, a waste management startup. Conplas specializes in converting non-recyclable waste into valuable products, such as eco-blocks and eco-grease.

These eco-blocks serve as eco-friendly infrastructure materials for paving and pot blocks. Similarly, eco-grease, derived from processed plastic waste, functions as a solid lubricant, commonly used in vehicles. By changing perceptions of waste sorting, Conplas has contributed to

a 40% increase in income through waste bank contributions.

Sudirman and his colleagues underwent transformative training with UNDP's Blue Finance Accelerator, deepening their knowledge, business confidence, and connections within the blue sector.

A former migrant worker dedicates herself to ensuring safe and fair labour migration for others

To fulfill her dream of throwing a big ceremony for his son's religious circumcision, Parjiyati migrated to Saudi Arabia as a domestic worker 19 years ago. However, her agency rushed her to sign an employment contract without allowing her to read it thoroughly. Parjiyati's agency became unresponsive as soon as she arrived in Saudi Arabia, and her employer withheld her salary for three years while threatening to forfeit it if she returned to Indonesia.



In 2019, the National Agency for the Protection of Indonesian Migrant Workers (BP2MI) recorded 278 cases of labour rights violations and gender-based violence against women migrant workers from Cirebon. Parjiyati reflects, "Back at the time, formal information on safe migration was not easily accessible. My only source of information was my friends and family."

Now a network leader, Parjiyati works with the Integrated Gender Responsiveness-One-Roof Integrated Service (LTSA-MRC) to equip Indonesian migrant workers with the information they need and protect them from potential risks.

BERANI II Programme Launched to End Maternal Deaths, Gender-based Violence, and Harmful Practices in Indonesia

Every woman and girl have the right to health, autonomy, and a life free from violence and discrimination. To ensure the fulfillment of these rights, the Government of Indonesia, UNFPA, UNICEF and UN Women, with support from Global Affairs Canada (GAC), launched Phase II of the "Better Reproductive Health and Rights for All in Indonesia" (BERANI II) programme in Jakarta on 25 January.

Phase I of BERANI, from 2018 to 2023 in 28 cities/districts in 13 provinces, led to significant improvements in women and young people's quality of life. For example, the maternal mortality ratio (MMR) decreased from 305 to 189 maternal deaths per 100,000 live births between 2015 and 2020.

Implemented from August 2023 to December 2027 at the both national level and in 26 districts/cities in 14 provinces, BERANI II will continue the important work of ending maternal mortality, gender-based violence, and harmful practices such as child marriage and female genital mutilation/cutting—as reflected in the National Medium Term Development Plan (RPJMN) 2020-2024.

UN in Indonesia and Radio Republik Indonesia (RRI) Unite for Climate Change Action with UN Experts Dialogues



Media plays a crucial role in shaping public perceptions and responses to climate change, as highlighted by the UN's Intergovernmental Panel of Experts on Climate Change (IPCC) report. Despite increased global coverage, misinformation from organized counter-movements poses a significant challenge, leading to polarization and hampering effective climate policy.

To address this, the UN in Indonesia partners with Radio Republik Indonesia (RRI) to host interactive dialogue sessions featuring UN experts. This year's first session involved as speakers Verania Andria (UNDP), Johan Kieft (UNEP), Dwi Yuliawati Faiz (UN Women), and Nofiyatul Chalimah, the recipient of the UN in Indonesia's Climate Change Media Fellowship.

The talkshow was broadcast through RRI's network of 68 stations across Indonesia. Unlike a regular radio show, the discussion took place in front of an audience of school and university students, who also took part in the conversation. [Watch the whole session here.](#)

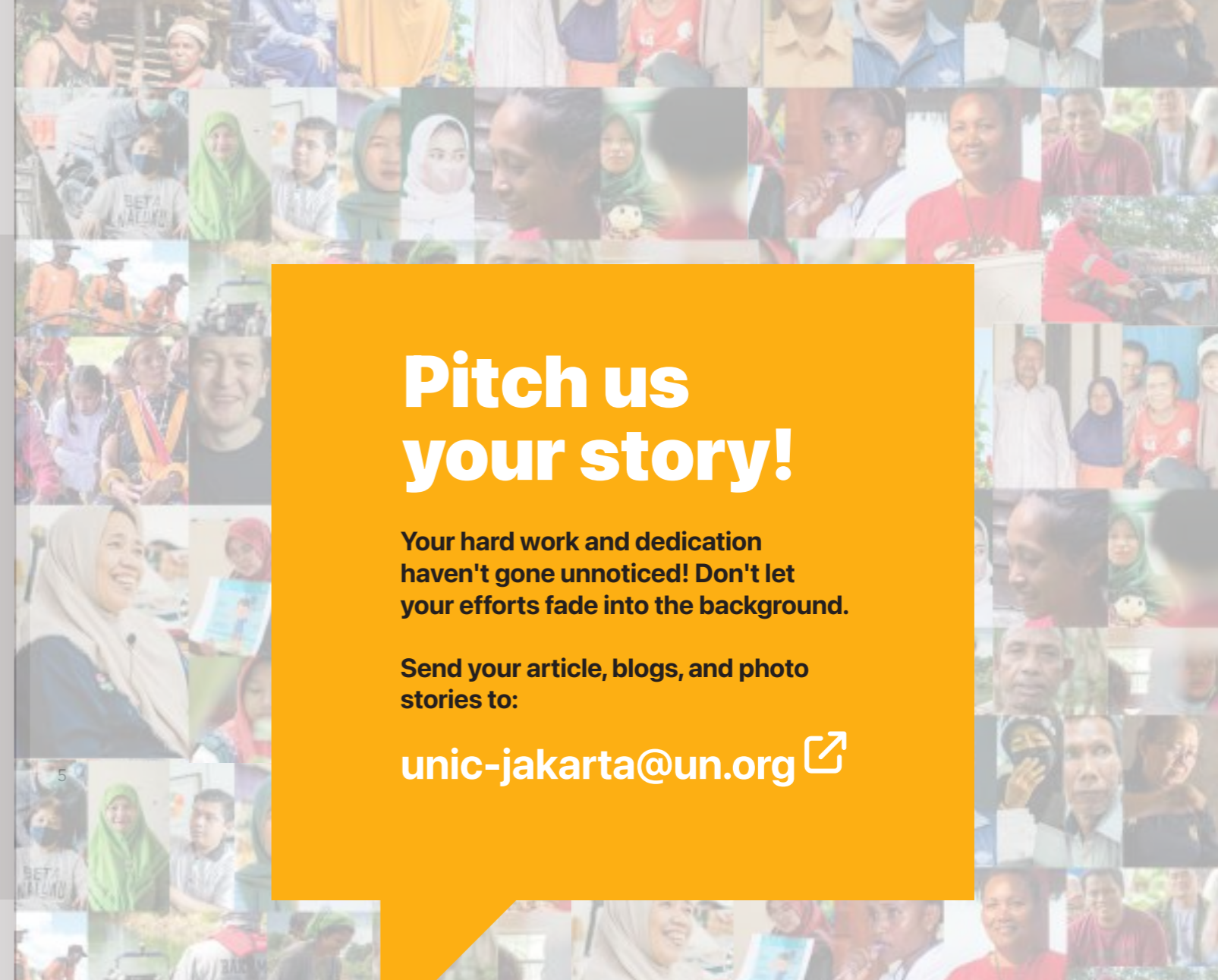
Climate change, biodiversity loss and pollution
